

Biographies

Anna Badia holds a PhD in Geography from the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona in 2001. Her research focuses on land use and land-cover change, and especially changes related to urban sprawl and forest fires. Since 1994 she teaches at the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona at undergraduate and post-graduate level. Her main subject is GISs and their application to environmental planning. She has authored more than 30 scientific papers and articles in several journals, including *International Journal of Wildland Fire*, *Land Use Policy*, *Scripta Nova*, and *Boletín de la Asociación de Geógrafos Españoles*.

Martí Boada holds a PhD in Environmental Sciences from the Autonomous University of Barcelona, a degree in Geography from the same institution, and degrees in Sociology (ICESB) and Chemistry (Industrial School of Barcelona). He is senior professor and researcher at the Department of Geography and the Institute of Environmental Science and Technology (ICTA) of the Autonomous University of Barcelona. His main research focuses are global change and biodiversity from a social perspective, with special emphasis on urban system and forests. He directs the research group 'Conservation, Ethnoecology and Global Change' (2009 SGR 569). He is visiting assistant professor at the universities of Montana, Santa Barbara, California (USA); Zacatecas and Morelia (Mexico). Since 2008 he is a researcher in the Spanish National Antarctic Program. He is a member of the ConservCom Community Conservation project, based in Mexico, and the Pegaso project (People for Ecosystem-Based Governance in Assessing Sustainable Development of Ocean and Coast). He is a member of the IUCN (International Committee for Education and Communication); the UNEP Spanish committee; and the Spanish "Man and Biosphere" UNESCO program. He received the Global 500 UN Award in 1995 and the National Environmental Prize in 2003.

John Dargavel is an honorary Visiting Fellow in the Fenner School for Environment and Society at the Australian National University, where he is actively engaged in forest history research. He has degrees in forestry from the Universities of Edinburgh and Melbourne. His doctorate from the Australian National University presented a radical analysis of the development of the Tasmanian wood industries. He worked as a forester in government and industry for over twenty years, before moving to the Australian National University in 1978. He has researched and taught in the areas of forest economics, politics and history. He is the immediate past President of the Australian Forest History Society. He is the author of more than 70 published papers covering forest management, industrial

and labour history, trade, forest and environmental politics, and cultural aspects of landscape and remembrance. He has edited 10 books of conference proceedings on forest policy and history. He is the author of a book on Australian forest history, *Fashioning Australia's Forests* (Oxford University Press, 1995), and a biography, *The Zealous Conservator: a life of Charles Lane Poole* (University of Western Australia Press, 2008).

Gemma Estany obtained her degree on Environmental Sciences at the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona in 2006. In 2008 she earned her master's degree in Environmental Studies at the Institute of Environmental Science and Technology (ICTA, Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona). She has carried out research in landscape transformation within global change trying to bridge the gap between natural and social analysis of landscape change. She has also researched in environmental history, water consumption, socio-ecological heritage, and the appreciation of local traditional knowledge in Mediterranean systems. Since 2010 she works in the field of rural development.

Alexander Fehér is an Associate Professor at the Department of Sustainable Development, Slovak University of Agriculture in Nitra, and the director of the Baltic University Programme Centre for Slovakia. He holds degrees in crop production (1991) and environmental ecology (1999), and earned his doctorate in landscape engineering (2001). He is a member of the Slovak Ecological Society of the Slovak Academy of Sciences (SAS), the Slovak Botanical Society of the SAS, the Czech Botanical Society, the British Ecological Society, the European working group on biological invasions NEOBIOTA, and the editorial boards of *Acta Environmentalia et Regionalia* (Slovakia) and *Management of Environmental Quality* (Germany). His main scientific interests are biological invasions, agro-biodiversity, and the history of vegetation and habitats in agricultural landscapes (wetlands, alkali habitats, grasslands, abandoned fields, forests etc.) in Central Europe.

Jó Klanovicz is Assistant Professor at the History Department of Universidade Estadual do Centro-Oeste do Paraná (www.unicentro.br), Irati campus. He was awarded a CNPq post-doctorate fellowship for conducting research in the ethno-history and environmental History of the Kaingang, Xokleng and Guarani indigenous groups in Southern Brazil (2007-2008). He holds a Ph.D. in History from the Federal University of Santa Catarina, where he did research on the environmental history of apple production in Southern Brazil. He has published his work in Brazil, Croatia, Germany, and USA. His research interests include the environmental history of Latin America, disasters in history, hubris in agriculture, and history of science. He is currently editing a book of new studies in the environmental history of Southern Brazil. He is a member of the Sociedad Latinoamericana y Caribeña de Historia Ambiental (Solcha), the Brazilian Historical Association (Anpuh), and the Brazilian Society for the History of Science (SBHC).

Vimbai C. Kwashirai is an expert on social and economic development in Southern Africa. Much of his research focuses on the interface between rural and urban poverty and environmental change, human rights and natural resource management. Among other publications, his single-authored works include *Conservationism in Zimbabwe 1850-1950* (New York: Nova Science Publishers, 2008), where he compares and contrasts 40 years of pre-colonial ecological practices with 60 years of colonial extractive policies in game, forest, mineral and soil management; *Green Colonialism in Zimbabwe 1890-1980* (New York: Cambria Press, 2009), which addresses the key question: 'Are humans capable of achieving balance in the natural resource consumption-conservation nexus?'; and *The Three Poverties in Zimbabwe; Poverty, Poverty and Poverty* (New York: Nova Science Publishers, 2010), where he explores the multidimensional dilemmas and experiences of poverty in the pre-colonial, colonial and post-colonial eras. He is a Georg Foster Senior Researcher of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation at Essen University, Germany. Apart from his academic research interests, Kwashirai is a passionate campaigner for human rights and social justice.

Iago Otero is currently working as a Researcher at the Institute for Environmental Science and Technology (ICTA) of the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona (UAB), Spain, where he obtained his PhD in Environmental Sciences. He is interested in socio-ecological transformations in Mediterranean mountain areas along the rural-urban transition, and has conducted case studies in this field in Catalonia, Italy and Morocco, combining the perspectives of political ecology, environmental history, environmental management and action-research. He is the author of several scientific articles and books for the general public.

Desirée A.L. Quagliarotti is a Researcher at the National Research Council, Italy. In 2000 she obtained a Master's degree in Agricultural Economics and Policy at the Agricultural Economics and Policy Department, Faculty of Agriculture of the University Federico II in Naples. She obtained her Ph.D. in the Economics of Food and Environmental Resources at the University Parthenope in Naples in 2001. Her research is focused on aspects of agricultural and environmental economics such as food security and sustainable development in Mediterranean countries, desertification and water resource management, natural resources and non-market evaluation methods. She is currently doing research on the economic, social and environmental impact of the Euro-Mediterranean Free Trade Area, and notably on the relationship between the liberalization of trade and water demand in Mediterranean countries. She has written several articles on water and environmental problems in the Mediterranean Region.

V.M. Ravi Kumar earned his doctoral (2006) and master's degree in (1999) from the University of Hyderabad, India. He was associated with Centre for Economic and Social Studies, Hyderabad and involved in several projects on

community forest management in South Asia. He is currently Assistant Professor at the Department of History, Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University, Lucknow, India. His areas of interest are environmental history, the history of the Dalit movement, and the economic history of India. He has published more than 20 articles in journals and edited several books. Some of his articles appeared in *Indian Journal of Human Rights* and the *International Journal of South Asian Studies*. He has papers accepted for publication in forthcoming issues of *Economic and Political Weekly* and *Journal of Pacific Area Studies*.
